ASTHMA FRIENDLY CHAMPIONS RECOGNIZED AT OPEN DOOR

Ellette Hirschorn and **Steve Mandes** were recognized in June by The American Lung Association as "Asthma-Friendly Schools Initiative Champions" for their tireless efforts in creating a safe environment for Port Chester Middle School students with asthma. The award honors schools, school districts and volunteers who have developed or supported comprehensive asthma management plans in schools. Ellette and Steve's efforts have resulted in a 75% drop in missed school days and a 55% decrease in unplanned visits to the school nurse due to asthma-related causes. "Asthma makes breathing difficult for nearly 7 million children in America and is a leading cause of school absenteeism," said Scott Santarella, President and CEO, American Lung Association in New York. "The Lung Association has been leading the fight against asthma for many years, through research, education and advocacy. By supporting the Asthma Friendly Schools Initiative, Ellette Hirschorn, Steven Mandes, and Open Door Family Medical Centers have helped kids with asthma stay healthy, in school and ready to learn."



From The Front-Line:

One of the most empowering and reaffirming reasons why so many of my clinician colleagues and I enjoy working in this special institution is that Open Door really brings innovation and research to the front-lines of medical care. Most people know that we offer accessible, low-cost care to the community. However, what most people don't know is how effective and high quality that care is.

Every physician is board-certified or eligible in his or her specialty and every primary care clinician receives a quarterly "Clinical Report Card" giving the individual an idea of how he or she is doing with their patients. Most medical practices do not have the capability of generating these objective, measurable data sets, but through the use of an electronic medical record, we can.

Our ability to perform community and population-specific outreach, coupled with an uncompromising at-

tention to the quality of care we render, are just some of the concrete reasons that have led us to be nationally recognized. This speaks to our culture, our staff and our commitment and value to the community. Just recently, we received the HIMSS (Health Information Management Systems Society) Davies Award for the best implementation – out of all the community health centers in the nation – of an electronic medical record in the interest of delivering greater and more effective medical care.

We really do bring the leading edge of informatics and technology to extend the clinical reach of our providers and this institution. In doing so, we help to maintain the health and productivity of individuals, their families and the entire community.

Open Door Recognized Nationally As Information Technology Innovator

Open Door received the coveted national 2010 HIMSS Community Health Davies Award for Excellence for its implementation and use of health information technology. This is the highest recognition of excellence that a community health organization can receive for its use of electronic health records. What this means is that Open Door is transforming health care through the effective use of information technology and management systems to improve the quality, safety, access and cost-effectiveness of patient care.

As a Joint Commission accredited health center and a National Committee on Quality Assurance (NCQA) Level III Patient-Centered Medical Home, Open Door embraces knowledge sharing and collaboration with numerous partners to improve information exchange in the health care system and ensure efficiencies and benefits that can transform the public health of all res-

idents in the community. This is particularly critical as this nation struggles with cost and quality issues in health care.

"Our ability to leverage health care technology to improve reporting tools and to achieve care quality and operational efficiencies benefits not only the patients we serve, but the community at large," says Lindsay Farrell, President & CEO of Open Door.

FUTURE HEALTH CARE LEADERS

Congratulations to the fifteen Port Chester High School students who completed their Future Health Leaders training in August with Open Door. The four-week summer intensive program gave students a comprehensive overview of health-related career opportunities unavailable to them anywhere else. Through the Future Health Leaders program, students become well-versed in a wide range of health topics, including basic medical training, nutrition, exercise, adolescent medicine and mental health. They learned how to take vital signs and provide first-aid. By the end of the program, they had earned their CPR-Certification. In addition to their own training, the students led a summer safety skills class for second-graders and met with health professionals at every level. "They are now peer leaders and mentors to their fellow students because of this program," says Ellette Hirschorn, RN, Director of Clinical Services and Programs.

RECOGNITION FOR PATIENT CARE COORDINATION

Francia Ortiz, Open Door's Supervisor of Patient Advocacy, was awarded The Paul Ramos Memorial Award from the Community Health Care Association of New York State. This award recognizes her leadership and dedication in expanding the Center's patient advocacy program to nine advocates who support 60 licensed providers. Back To School

The ability to provide health care services within the schools makes a profound difference in the health of the students enrolled in the program.

Shiny new lunch boxes and backpacks weren't the only things students and parents saw on the first day of school at the Park Avenue School in Port Chester. The doors to our school-based health center opened at the Park Avenue School this September. This is our fifth school-based health center in four years, including centers at The Edison Elementary School, Kennedy Magnet School, Port Chester Middle School and Port Chester High School. By September 7th, half of Park Avenue School's students had enrolled in the new health center staffed by Open Door providers Debra Gerson, MD, Robin Dillon, NP and Patient Care Technician Gloria Neyra. Today 2,910 students are enrolled in all five school-based health centers.

"Our first day on-site was great, meeting and greeting students and staff," said Ellette Hirschorn, Director of Clinical Services and Programs for Open Door. "The school community gave us a very warm welcome."

The ability to provide health care services within the schools makes a profound difference in the health of the students enrolled in the program which has served Port Chester since 2007. Dr. Gerson, the Medical Director of School-Based Health Centers, recalls

one patient whose visit to the school-based center saved his vision in one eye, "Alejandro had been hit in the eye with a soccer ball over the weekend and came in to see me complaining about a serious pain in his right eye. He was seeing floaters and his vision was blurred. After examining him, I immediately arranged for him to see an eye doctor that afternoon, where he was diagnosed with a detached retina. He was scheduled for surgery the next day. According to Alejandro's surgeon, he would have lost vision in his right eye if the retina detached further. This is one example of the value of immediate and affordable access to care."

Open Door's school-based health centers have the ability to identify such serious conditions. But that's not all; these centers provide numerous services including physicals, immunizations, wellness visits, chronic disease management, hearing and vision screenings, and mental health screenings. They are there to help students and their families manage significant health concerns like asthma and obesity before they lead to bigger problems. The school-based health program is available to all students who are enrolled by their parents.

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Open Door Faces Funding Cuts: We Need Your Support NOW

County Executive Robert Astorino has proposed the elimination of \$1.9 million in County support for three neighborhood health centers in Westchester. Open Door will lose more than \$500,000 of Westchester County Department of Health funding. Eliminating the County investment will end the County contracts with the centers for the screening and treatment of communicable diseases, such as measles, whooping cough, and hepatitis B. It will also end the County's contracts with centers to deliver services under Title VI of the state Public

Health Law, which requires the immunization of school-age children for 11 communicable diseases. According to public health statistics, outside of New York City, Westchester has the second-highest number of residents with tuberculosis, the most people living with HIV/AIDS, and the highest rate of newly diagnosed cases of HIV. A funding cut of this magnitude will be a devastating blow to Open Door and will seriously impact its ability to meet the needs of the local community. We need your help today. Please contact your local legislators today; ask them to reinstate these funds.
